

MISSION AND VISION

The Agribusiness Talent Council is a collaborative of employers, educators, workforce development and economic development organizations working together to foster a thriving agribusiness sector in West Michigan.

Together, we can attract and retain a skilled workforce while promoting the industry.



INDUSTRY IMPACT

West Michigan's agribusiness sector is a powerhouse, producing one-third of Michigan's total agricultural sales and contributing over \$13 billion to our regional economy. The food and agriculture system remains a vital

source of employment, accounting for approximately 17 percent of the state's total employment, with over 31,500 agribusiness jobs in West Michigan. This industry is comprised of five subsectors: food processing, which represents the largest share of agricultural employment, followed by farming, agricultural wholesale and retail, input supplies and regulation of agricultural marketing and commodities. The sector's strength underscores its critical role in our state's economy and employment landscape.

West Michigan is a hub for food and agriculture—producing over 40 percent of Michigan's agribusiness-related sales and home to nearly 300 food and beverage manufacturers. Yet few people consider agribusiness careers. We are changing that by showing students and adults that this industry offers rewarding opportunities—and it's growing (pun intended).

MICHIGAN DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT (MDARD) GRANT

Farmers often face challenges accessing training grants due to the seasonal nature of their workforce, and many training opportunities for food processors fall outside the scope of existing grant programs. Through funding provided by the MDARD Specialty Crop Block grant over the past two and a half years, we have successfully supported workforce development by reimbursing the full cost of training – more than \$30,000 – for 16 employers and 38 employees in leadership and food safety.

This grant made a big impact by helping us improve our regulatory and compliance processes at a critical time. We're truly grateful for the support and would absolutely recommend this opportunity to other businesses. It's a well-managed

SPOTLIGHT ON AG-READERS

The response to Spotlight on Ag Readers was incredible, with 56 classrooms across our region registering to participate. Volunteer involvement also grew significantly—44 agribusiness professionals served as readers, including 24 first-time participants. This allowed 1,273 students to participate in this career exploration program that engages students through age-appropriate books and lessons that spark curiosity about careers in agriculture in a fun and informative way.

Our entire second-grade team participated in this program, with each class welcoming different readers from four unique agribusiness organizations. It was fascinating to hear students' questions about agriculture and farming. They love learning from experts.
